

From the Rabbi

To live in the greater Brandon area is to understand all too well what it is like to be a minority and the challenges that go along with that reality. Many of us work hard to educate others who often ask questions out of ignorance and genuine curiosity. Sometimes the questions are more critical and offensive. The High Holy Days (which begin Oct. 2) present a particularly challenging time, because our major days of celebration occur on seemingly random, ordinary weekdays. We are having serious services and major family gatherings while everyone





It's not always easy to be Jewish in school. You may be the only Jewish kid in your class or your school or the only Jew your friends and teachers know. Sometimes you may be asked questions about your beliefs or traditions, and it may feel awkward to know what to say. And then come Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur – the holiest days of the Jewish year. I know that for many of you it seems very difficult to have to go to a teacher or principal and say you will be missing school for these Holy Days. It's hard to explain to your friends. And – especially in high school, even missing one day can mean a lot of work to make up. But people of all religions make an effort to lift up to their values and celebrate important occasions. We Jews must do so too. For sure it may mean extra effort and extra work – and it may even be a little uncomfortable to have to explain. But, to be a Jew is to make a commitment to certain sacred occasions and to be there for others in the community who come together. Those of you older than 13 are responsible for your Jewish decisions, and they are often not easy. Please plan to join us – I look forward to seeing you in synagogue at the High Holy Days.

A Message to Parents of School-Aged Students

As our kids reach a certain age, we – appropriately – give them a degree of freedom about their Jewish choices. For those older than 13, that is exactly the message of becoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah. However, as parents, we can influence their decisions. I hope you will urge and expect your children to miss school for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. That includes helping to teach them how to talk to teachers and reassuring them that missing and needing to make up work is a sacrifice worth making in order to join with the community on these Holy Days. To be a Jew in a multi-cultural society like ours requires effort – and sometimes sacrifice. Our kids are not too young to learn this truth. It is important to know that it is the official policy of Hillsborough County not to schedule major events or testing on Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur. The Tampa Rabbinic Association, in coordination with the Jewish Community Relations Council, has worked very hard with the school board to make sure this policy is understood and shared. If your school or an individual teacher acts in violation of this policy, you can gently educate them about the policy, or speak to me, and I will be happy to do so. I also have a letter of explanation that you can take to give to the teachers. When we ignore these policies or shrug our shoulders when they are disregarded, we undermine the message the Jewish community is sending. The best way to help others understand the importance of Judaism is if we act in a way that reflects its importance. Please make it a point to discuss this with your children. I look forward to worshipping with your entire family at the Holy Days.

From the President - David Friedman

The subject of Temple security is very important and timely. It is for this reason that I felt compelled to have reprinted here the recent letter you should have already received.

We live in wonderful times. Technology has made our lives easier in so many ways. With our smartphones, the world is at our fingertips. We're living longer with advancements in medicine. And yet, everything in our state, our country and the world is not so terrific. The reality is, we live in turbulent times.

Since that awful tragedy on Sept. 11, 2001, we have continued to see tremendous violence and senseless killings all over the world. Recently however, violence has shown its face on American soil. To be specific, there was a terrible tragedy last December in San Bernardino, California, and on June 12th, much closer to home, in Orlando.

In the wake of this, the Tampa JCC sponsored a meeting in June that was presented by Critical Intervention Services. Yes, they were there to market themselves, but they also provided good information. From our congregation, Michael Barnett and Michelle McCormick attended this presentation and shared the information with the Executive Committee.

The security firm identified four different security methods used by synagogues and rated each one for its effectiveness, from most to least.

- 1. The most effective method of prevention is to have an off-duty sheriff, in his marked vehicle, posted outside.
- 2. Posting a trained/armed individual inside. This means an armed individual with security experience would be posted inside.
- 3. Posting an armed individual inside, but without experience, which is less effective.
- 4. The least effective method is our current policy. All doors are locked except one while Religious School is in session. A volunteer is posted by the door to "greet" anyone who enters the building.

As the Executive Committee discussed this issue, we held one common theme in mind: *The children who attend Religious School at Congregation Beth Shalom are "OUR CHILDREN."*

After some discussion, the Executive Committee brought these recommendations to the Board of Directors at the July 5th Board meeting:

- That an off-duty Sheriff be hired to be on-site during Religious School hours.
- Present the Congregation with a one-time \$50.00 assessment this fiscal year to fund it. Those on dues exceptions can pay this over time.



A motion was then made and seconded that, "An off-duty sheriff will be hired for religious school, for this year. And a \$50.00 Security Fee will be assessed per congregational member unit.

The need for the assessment will be readdressed at the end of the fiscal/budget year."

The notion of a security fee is a new concept here at CBS. But in many synagogues, this is a line item on their application, so the concept is not new.

This last paragraph was not part of my letter but I'll disclose this to you. The recent attack, even in "neighboring" Orlando, may seem like "an ocean away" to some, but not to me. My G-d-daughter use to frequent the nightclub where the attack took place. Fortunately, for the Friedman family, she was not in town "that night."

I look forward to seeing everyone at the upcoming High Holidays.



Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- Tree of Life: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt. If your donation is incorrectly listed or omitted, please notify the temple office immediately.
