The Days of Awe - Why Do You Come?

People often ask me why it is that so many Jews who do not actively participate or come to Shabbat services during the year come on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Some suggest a cynical answer: people come out of guilt, out of a feeling of obligation to tradition, their parents or God. There may of course be an element of truth to these, but I think there are deeper reasons. The Days of Awe carry powerful



messages – about the possibility of change, about responsibility, about living lives of meaning and purpose. In ways that we may find hard to articulate (and whether or not we are even consciously aware of it), these messages resonate in a deeply powerful manner. But, of course, we could, in theory, sit at home on Rosh Hashanah and meditate on these prayers, read poetry, reflect on the ways we want to change. There is even an iPhone app to listen to the shofar! We instinctively know, however, that this would be an immensely unsatisfying experience. Why? Because a large part of the meaning of the Days of Awe is being together with a community: standing together, hearing the words together, singing the special melodies together, seeing the people we haven't seen in a year. The opportunity to come together, to feel the bonds with those we know and those we haven't yet met, to confess our sins together ("we have sinned," says our confessional prayer), to experience the opening of the new year with our people – this is the power of the new year. Why do you come? You can answer this question better than I, but your presence helps to make us a community, and we need you.

The Days of Awe — What is special about 5775?

What were you doing 25 years ago? I was being ordained as a rabbi, and Congregation Beth Shalom was founded. As this year gets underway, we begin to celebrate a remarkable milestone for our congregation – a quarter of a century of growth, years filled with Torah and learning, *simchas* and worship, challenge and opportunity. On the High Holydays we will begin to mark this wonderful event, honoring those who have been part of our own chain of tradition, celebrating those whose volunteer work continues to enrich and strengthen our community. We will emphasize the role that so many have played over the years – and continue to play – in making CBS so special. As always, our services will feature Torah readers and teachers from our youth and our membership and a renewed emphasis on welcoming and creating bonds of friendship and connection.

As always, we will provide you materials and opportunities to help you prepare for these Days of Awe. Beginning at the end of August, there will be CDs available with the unique seasonal melodies. A special book, *Preparing your Heart for the High Holy Days* by Dr. Kerry Olitzky, will be available with daily reflections for the month of spiritual preparation that is traditional for Rosh Hashanah. Our Selichot service and play by our CBS Players will set the mood and the tone for the Days of Awe in a deeply thoughtful manner.

Prepare, be part of the community, celebrate 25 years of Jewish life. What better steps can you take toward a year of meaning and joy? Michael, Gideon, Aaron and Hannah join me in wishing all of you a *l'shanah tovah u'metukah* - a year of sweetness, blessing and peace.

What Did You Do On Your Summer Vacation?

Part I

This question is a blast from my past, both as a student and a teacher. Summer is the time of relaxation, visiting grandparents, vacationing on foreign soil or taking those local day-trips we put off. Or is it?

This summer, like many former teacher summers, I decided to use the period of time for study and enrichment in my field of music. Through the Rabbi, I learned about Mifgash Musicale, the Guild of Temple Musicians Conference at Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, Ohio. It sounded like a place to learn new music and techniques for leading our choir. A rigorous week for sure. But I liked the challenge, so I took off, determined to bring back enriching materials for our congregation. What I gained was that and so much more. I found nourishment for my Jewish soul.

The first thing I did before the conference actually opened was to visit the Skirball Museum, one of the oldest repositories of Jewish cultural artifacts in America, founded in 1875. As I browsed through the many artifacts that were preserved, I thought about the people they represented, people like us. They knew love and faced hardships like we do today. They tried to find peace in an often hostile world. But the prejudices of others caused

them to constantly feel unsettled. I asked myself, "What was God's purpose for them? How can we find peace? How can we pass on our values of love and peace?"

I had a similar feeling when visiting the Isaac M. Wise Temple on Plum Street. The building itself and its interior were breathtaking. The striking décor was lit by hundreds and hundreds of light bulbs. And I was overjoyed in getting to see first-hand the Tracker Organ that was in perfect condition and in continued use.

Cantor Katzew sang High Holy Days music from the Bima with the organ accompanying from the loft above. The music gave me goose bumps. Again, I felt the dreams of people in the past. But the difference here was that the Temple lives on and is still in use today.

Look for Part II next month. Meanwhile, just a reminder that High Holy Days rehearsals begin on August 25. Anyone interested in singing with the choir, please feel free to contact me. The choir sings on Erev Rosh Hashanah on September 24 and on Yom Kippur morning. All our music is written with Hebrew transliteration.

BESTY KICKS OFF-September 14

Are you my BESTY? You should be! BESTY is our very own temple youth group (Beth Shalom Temple Youth), for teens in 8th through 12th grade. It's an opportunity for them to connect with their peers, stay connected to their temple, and find further connections with their faith, in a fun environment designed for them. The group meets monthly for personal and leadership development and will also have other activities off site throughout the year.

We are an chapter of a national organization called NFTY - National Federation of Temple Youth, which is comprised of chapters all over the United States and Canada. Coming in February is the national convention of NFTY - which will be held in Atlanta! We do hope to send a contingency to represent Beth Shalom. Our Regional affiliation is called NFTY-STR (Southern Tropical Region) and there are 5 regional weekend events that occur every year - 3 for grades 9 - 12 and one for 8th

graders, - a fall kallah (this year Oct. 24 -26th in Plantation, FL), a winter kallah (Dec. 26 - 30th in Orlando, FL), a Haktivah kallah for 8th graders only (still TBD), a spring kallah (Feb. 27 - 29th right here in Tampa!) and a leadership training weekend for teens who become Board members. Throughout the year there are additional opportunities for local youth groups to collaborate and get to know each other, which most of our teens really enjoy.

The kick off meeting will be September 14th at 12:15 - 2:00 pm at the temple. There is a fee to join of \$66 (\$36 BESTY/\$30 NFTY) and an application for both youth and parents to review, fill out and agree upon. Parents will be called upon from time to time for assistance with supervision of events, transportation, and chaperoning trips. A parent meeting will be held also on Sept. 14th also at 12:15. The parent meeting should only run about 30 - 45 minutes and will cover questions about kallot, parent participation and leadership opportunities for youth.

SELICHOT PLAY & SERVICE—September 20 at 7 PM

The CBS Players will once again bring sliceof-life drama to the stage on Selichot with a series of five vignettes collectively titled "The Waiting Room."

The original work, written and directed by Anna Brubaker (with help from assistant director Milt Newman), will be presented on Saturday, September 20, at 7 pm at the synagogue. The vignettes, all set in a local hospital's ICU waiting room, spotlight characters already familiar to those who have seen previous productions like "Dedication," "Windows," and "Cleaning House," but they will be relevant and engaging even to those who have never seen any of the shows in this series.

The characters related by marriage, Audrey (Vickie Goldberg) and Jennifer (Stephanie Ferry) star in the first vignette, "Light and Dark," which demonstrates how two people can have markedly different views about the same person – and how those differences can come between them.

Commitment-shy Lyle (Jeff Newman) is put on the spot by the woman he's been seeing long-distance, Maggie (Lauren Weisman) in Vignette # 2, "Here and There." Their interaction spotlights how two people can have completely different expectations of the same relationship — but avoid voicing those expectations until it may be too late.

Serial online dater Dr. Mensche Goldblatt (Milt Newman) and his often child-like daughter Ellen (Keren Vergon) are featured in the third vignette, "Near and Far." Their humorous yet poignant conversation is both unsettling and reassuring about a subject that people see — and fear — in very different, individual ways.

Sisters Alice (Gail Verlin) and Naomi (Joan Frankel) approach a serious situation in Alice's life in the fourth vignette, "In and Out," one that is becoming increasingly common in today's society — helping adult children. The sisters' different viewpoints echo the dynamics they themselves had between them growing up and show that two people can try to solve problems in strongly opposing — but well-meaning — ways.

The last vignette, "Around and Around," highlights teshuvah – repentance — as Josh (Joel Edelson) and Gila (Anna Brubaker) struggle with resolving a clandestine relationship each sees — and repents for — very differently.

The show is free and open to the public; one does not have to be Jewish to attend or to understand the themes of the presentation. Rabbi Torop will lead an interactive discussion of the situations presented in the show immediately afterwards. Congregants are encouraged to bring dairy desserts for all to share after the discussion. The evening will conclude with an intimate Selichot service.

"Selichot" refers to two related types of penitential prayers. The first are the prayers that are customarily recited daily at early morning services during the month of Elul. This is also the name of the service that takes place late at night on the Saturday preceding Rosh Hashanah and consists of a longer series of these penitential prayers. The play uses drama and humor to help foster the healthy self-reflection and contemplation encouraged at this time of year.

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Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- Building Fund: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- Religious School Scholarship Fund: These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- Rabbi's Discretionary Fund: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- Tree of Life: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- Yahrzeit Plaque: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.

Unless otherwise noted by you, your gift will be acknowledged in the Kibbitzer the month following its receipt.
