Becoming a Jewish Adult

I've been thinking about Bar and Bat Mitzvah lately. No doubt this is because of the upcoming Bat Mitzvah of my daughter, our youngest child, later this month. The starting of a new group of adult b'nai mitzvah students – and their thoughts about the desire to learn, lead worship and read Torah – has also been reverberating in my mind and spirit. And, as I write today, about half a dozen students are at various points in their learning toward becoming Bar/Bat Mitzvah, and another four students will start tutoring with Keren Vergon in the next few months. We often take for granted that our young people go through this rite of passage without really considering what it means not only for them but for our community and the Jewish people.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah is a Journey

When each student begins tutoring, we expect him or her to know key prayers and have the ability to read Hebrew by sounding out words, the result of a strong Religious School education. Keren teaches them the prayers of the service – not only the ones they lead, but prayers such as Mourner's Kaddish and MiChamocha that are a part of regular worship. Many of our children learn Torah trope (the melody for chanting Torah) so that they can read Torah again. They learn their Torah and Haftarah portion and study their Torah portion with me so that they can understand it and be a teacher of Torah. They attend four family programs with their parents to better understand what it is to become Bar/Bat Mitzvah, and they do a mitzvah project to emphasize that being committed Jews is also about caring for the world. I tell each student that the actual day when they lead services is not what shows their commitment – that's the easy part. It's the journey to get there that is the challenge. And like with all journeys, when they think they've arrived, the road has actually only just begun.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah is about Jewish Community

Each Bar and Bat Mitzvah is different – just as each student is different. We encourage students to grow their Jewish muscles and skills to their maximum capability. In that respect, each service is unique. But although they are not all the same, Bar/Bat Mitzvah is a communal event – not a private one. No invitation is required to worship. It saddens me that more of our community doesn't come to be part of the worship service that each young person leads. Bar and Bat Mitzvah is about becoming a responsible member of the Jewish community, so surely there ought to be a community present to welcome them? Our children get this. They understand that a *tallit* is not a garment for a day... but for one's Jewish life. We see in the numbers who continue to participate in Confirmation and Youth Group that they understand that Bar/Bat Mitzvah is the beginning of Jewish communal involvement and not the end. Moreover, the stronger their bonds are with each other and with the synagogue itself, the more likely they are to continue to participate. Community creates meaning. When they experience it with their peers on Sundays and feel it in the energy in the sanctuary on Shabbat morning, they are bound every more tightly to the Jewish people and the Jewish future. Our young people work hard to become Bar and Bat Mitzvah, and their families support and encourage them. But let's not forget that we have a role to play as well.□

The remainder of this piece is a continuation from last month's article regarding a short series closely exploring each aspect of the word *team*. More specifically, we will explore the "t" and how it relates to *togetherness*. "Our sacred literature does not use obscure language but describes most things in words clearly indicating their meaning. Therefore it is necessary at all times to delve into the literal meaning of words to achieve complete understanding of what is actually meant." -- Rabbi Samson Raphael Hirsch.

Togetherness has several meanings; however, I thought we should look at this term as it relates to our congregation's vision statement:

Congregation Beth Shalom of Brandon, Florida, will be a warm, caring inclusive Reform Jewish community which will provide opportunities for life-long study of Torah, for Avodah (worship), and Gemilut Chasadim (deeds of love and kindness).

One aspect of the vision statement is that we must cooperate with each other and set aside personal differences in order to accomplish our goals. This does not mean we should avoid discussions when there are varying opinions on a subject. It does mean for our congregation to run smoothly, all members must work together. This necessitates putting aside personal differences so that our goals can be achieved. We need to

cooperate and collaborate with each other. If there are conflicts, then these need to be resolved by using principles set out in the Torah.

Sometimes discussions get heated either at a board meeting or committee meeting. Once in a while someone will say something offensive or send an email that has inappropriate comments. I had an old supervisor say to me, "Hank, think before you speak." He also used to caution me to not send any correspondence whilst in a fit of anger. In both instances he was absolutely correct.

What I am trying to say is our time on this earth is brief compared to the history of humankind. So I will end with a brief statement from Bill Bradley: "Respect your fellow human being, treat them fairly, disagree with them honestly, enjoy their friendship, explore your thoughts about one another candidly, work together for a common goal and help one another achieve it."



Join us as we go back to the 1950's...

A part of our mission this year is to re-read classic books from many years ago which may be lost in the mists of time. In March, Page Turners will be discussing the 1959 collection of fiction by the American novelist Philip Roth, comprising the title novella "Goodbye, Columbus" and five short stories. Each story deals with the concerns of second- and third-generation assimilated American Jews as they leave the ethnic ghettos of their parents and grandparents and go on to college, to white-collar professions, and to life in the suburbs.



In addition to the title novella set in New Jersey, "Goodbye, Columbus" contains the five short stories: "The Conversion of the Jews," "Defender of the Faith," "Epstein," "You Can't Tell a Man by the Song He Sings," and "Eli, the Fanatic." The book was a critical success for Roth and won the 1960 U.S. National Book Award for Fiction.

KOLOT SHALOM NOTES

Our next choir Shabbat will be on February 7. The Torah parsha for that weekend will be Parsha Tetzaveh. One year ago I was working on this very portion for the Saturday morning service, to be celebrated on February 23, 2013. I never completed that D'var Torah due to my husband's medical emergency. Rabbi Torop assured me at that time that Torah study is never for naught. So it is with great emotion that I finish what I began.

Tetzaveh is the reading that commands the children of Israel to kindle the light in the Temple regularly. Why are we commanded to light the menorah? Rabbi Perry Netter asks if God needs our light. Do we leave the light on for God to find his way like Tom Bodette says in the motel commercial? "We'll leave the light on."

No. Light is a metaphor for the Torah. Those who love and study the Torah can bring the light into the world. In Isaiah 60:3 it says, "And nations shall walk by your light."

As Jews we *must* light the *ner tamid* in our own hearts, take it into the streets and outside world. In Itture Torah, we see that the word "ner" can be seen as an acrostic for *nefesh ruach*, a soul with spirit, the lamp we must light regularly.

Kolot Shalom will start our service with *Light These Lights* by Debbie Friedman. May you too find the lighting of your soul, nefesh ruach, from the kindling of our Shabbat lights.

- Our website, www.bethshalom-brandon.org, hosts an online calendar. If you happen to use Google Calendar or Microsoft Outlook, you can click on the event in our calendar and save a copy to your own.

Then contact the Temple Office for confirmation. Without contacting the office, your event will not be considered official and another event may be scheduled over it. WOMEN'S SEDER—APRIL 6

Women and Children Rejoice at this Wonderful Afternoon! Please mark your calendars so that you can bond with your Temple Family Members at this unique event.

Excerpt from The Why of Women's Seders
By Rabbi Susan P. Fendrick

In the words of longtime Jewish feminist Francine Klagsbrun, "Women's seders have become a phenomenon of our time... From New York to Nebraska, from Berlin to London, thousands of Jewish women throughout the world celebrate the Passover holiday every year with an evening of ceremony and remembrance led by women for women."

The timing of a women's seder — most frequently just before Passover (obviating the need for the food to be strictly kosher for Passover), or on a night during Passover other than the two first evenings (when women might want to be or be expected to be participating in more typical seders with a mixed-gender group of family and friends) — already suggests its position in Jewish ritual life. The women's seder stands a bit on the margin, critiquing, supplementing and serving as an implicit commentary on the traditional seder experience with its haggadah text. While for some women this is their most important — or in some cases only — significant connection to Passover, for the most part attendance at a women's seder serves to add a feminist, woman-centered dimension to the observance of the universally Jewish holiday of Passover.



Donations

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- **General Fund** (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund:** A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- **Endowment Fund :** Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- **Religious School Scholarship Fund:** These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund:** a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example – Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note, otherwise your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- **Adopt-A-Book:** A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- **Bricklets:** For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life:** The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180 and stones are \$1800.
- **Yahrzeit Plaque:** To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$250. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.
