FROM THE RABBI - Rabbi Bryan Mann

Finding Ways to Stay Grounded in Isolation

This past month for many of us has been hard. Our work, routines, and social events were and continue to be disrupted. Some of us lost a loved one to COVID-19 and were unable to mourn in the way we wanted or needed to. Many of us celebrated

Passover in an entirely new way. Even when we do leave the house, we do so with masks on. We walk around mostly empty streets. Society as we know it has changed.

This all has a deep effect on our psyche. Some medical professionals and spiritual leaders have said all of us are experiencing grief and/or trauma due to COVID-19. Grief and trauma effect everyone differently. Some of us might not even feel or recognize we are grieving. I know at times I have thought or even said out loud this past month, "Sure, my routines are different. Sure, I'm seeing people less. Sure, I'm staying inside a lot more, but my life hasn't changed THAT much."



When I truly confront the reality, when I sit down to really reflect on my feelings, however, I do recognize there is some amount of pain, sadness, and loss. Yes, Jewish tradition has rituals for mourning, for processing grief, but we're in a moment when even those rituals feel unsafe. We cannot sit shiva. We cannot gather in person to say kaddish, so what can we do?

Two things I have been doing are daily Jewish learning and counting the Omer. In terms of daily learning, I am regularly participating in SVARA's daily Mishna Chabura (<u>https://svara.org/drop-in-mishnah-chaburah-collective/</u>.) The most important thing this does is connect me to a big virtual community, where everyone is learning the same bit of text. I get to see many of the same people every day at the same time. I get to learn from incredible teachers. It is also extremely accessible in that it is only a half hour. It is something I can easily commit to and make time for. Even if SVARA is not the right community for you, finding a half hour to learn a text with another person or a small group over Zoom can be incredibly grounding.

This past month, with the help of the Omer Counter app from <u>www.neohasid.org/</u>, I have been counting the Omer. This short practice helps me reflect on how each day is truly different and unique. Especially, in this moment, when it feels like more than usual days just blend together and time doesn't really exist. Omer Counter provides quotes each day to reflect on related to the sefira of each week. If much of this paragraph did not make sense to you, I invite you to check out this detailed and vetted Wikipedia article: <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Counting_of_the_Omer</u>.

Spending a brief moment: blessing then reflecting, meditating, and journaling on particular qualities has helped ground me. It has helped me think deeply about ways I hope to grow. What I can be doing right now in this moment to cultivate that growth even in a time when routines are disrupted and I am feeling unrecognized grief or trauma.

One of my teachers, Rabbi Ebn Leader, consistently reminded us, his students, that we refer to Jewish prayer, Jewish learning, and other aspects of our Jewish/religious lives as spiritual practices. This means we have to practice. Practice takes work. Just as with an instrument, a skill, or a sport, when we begin, we will not immediately be adept, let alone masters. To practice means putting in the work. Sure, sometimes we realize after a bit of practice we picked the wrong instrument and will want to try another one, but whether it is daily learning, counting the Omer, or a different practice, I invite you, especially now, to pick up something you may have never tried before and see if it helps ground you. May we soon be able to meet in person. Who would have believed two months ago, we would be eight weeks into social distancing, the synagogue would be closed and we would be living through the first pandemic in a century?

We have yet to see how these past eight weeks and the next few weeks will forever change our society. But I assure you that even when things go back to "normal," a number of changes will remain permanent or acceptable. These will include a full embracement of doctor visits through video, mainstream offices and mandatory businesses accepting work from home options, and college and grade school realtime virtual classes. Notwithstanding we are still able to keep our traditions, even if modified a bit. Congregation Beth Shalom is currently offering virtual Shabbat services, with Rabbi Mann presiding, not only to all our members, but the greater Jewish community each Friday night. We are meeting the needs of our congregants who need assistance. And we are carrying on through this pandemic with our Jewish values intact. For all of our members assisting with mitzvot and tikkun olam, and other Jewish values, thank you!!

I am pleased to announce that in April, the board of directors voted unanimously to approve a contract with Rabbi Paul Schreiber, who will begin as Congregation Beth Shalom's new rabbi on July 1. Those who met with Rabbi Schreiber in March overwhelmingly requested we proceed with offering him a position with CBS and Rabbi Schreiber enthusiastically accepted the offer. We look forward to Rabbi Schreiber and his wife, Nancy, joining us and providing them with a warm welcome.

And while we are pleased to enter this new phase of rabbinical leadership with Rabbi Schreiber, we are also sorry to see Rabbi Mann leave CBS in June. During my tenure as president of CBS, I have fully appreciated my relationship with Rabbi Mann as well as all he has done for CBS during the past two years. Some say that any rabbi replacing a longterm rabbi is an interim rabbi, at best. CBS was Rabbi Mann's first congregation and Rabbi Mann saw us through some difficult times. Rabbi Mann was more than just an interim rabbi, he was able to provide clear leadership when needed. He provided pastoral care for all who sought it. And he personally helped me through some difficult times at CBS. I will certainly miss Rabbi Mann. Stay tuned for the announcement of a proper farewell.

Lastly, Congregation Beth Shalom's largest and least exciting project this year is continuing at an even more problematic pace than initially believed. As many of you know, the largest expenditure we have this year is replacement of our roof. The project is proceeding, but has been delayed due to a requirement that we replace the steel decking underneath the roofing membrane at substantial additional expense. Moreover, we have had leaks into the building due to the roofing work. And while we had a record breaking Kol Nidre fund drive and February fundraiser, those funds and more are being absorbed into the roofing repair expense. The board has worked hard not to levy a special assessment for

the repairs, but in doing so, we are draining our reserves. But when completed we will not have to replace the roof again until 2050. The only good thing about the roofing project is that it is taking place now, at a time we are not using the building. The only better time to have done the project would have been during Sukkot when we could have looked up and seen the stars!



I look forward to our first Shabbat after social distancing ends and seeing everyone back in the synagogue under our new roof. And if we are lucky, we may even be able to shake hands!



grandmothers and mothers cooked. We'll experiment with a "recipe" for combining culture, history, and creativity.






EDUCATION— Sheila Fishman



The Handmaid's Tale is the story of Offred, a Handmaid in the Republic of Gilead, a totalitarian and theocratic state that has replaced the United States of America. Because of dangerously low reproduction rates, Handmaids are assigned to bear children for elite couples that have trouble conceiving. Offred serves the Commander and his wife, Serena Joy, a former gospel singer and advocate for "traditional values." Offred is not the narrator's real

name—Handmaid names consist of the word "of" followed by the name of the Handmaid's Commander. Offred's freedom, like the freedom of all women, is completely restricted. She can leave the house only on shopping trips, the door to her room cannot be completely shut, and the Eyes, Gilead's secret police force, watch her every public move.

Margaret Atwood, whose work has been published in more than 40 countries, is the author of more than 50 books of fiction, poetry, and critical essays. Her novels include *Cat's Eye*, shortlisted for the Booker Prize; *Alias Grace*, which won the Giller Prize in Canada and the Premio Mondello in Italy; *The Blind Assassin*, winner of the 2000 Booker Prize; *Oryx and Crake*, shortlisted for the 2003 Booker Prize; *The Penelopiad; The Heart Goes Last; Hag-seed*; and *The Testaments*, a sequel to The Handmaid's Tale, published in September, 2019. Lag BaOmer is a festive day of outdoor celebration. Especially in Israel, many people celebrate with picnics and barbecues and use bonfires to symbolize the light of Torah.

You don't need to be in Israel to celebrate this festive day the Israeli way. Here is a recipes you can use to host your own festive and delicious Lag BaOmer picnic or barbecue.

Grilled Steak with Chimichurri Sauce and Orange Slices (by Tina Wasserman)

Ingredients: CHIMICHURRI SAUCE:

1/2 cup tightly packed parsley
1/4 cup chopped onion
4 cloves of garlic, chopped
1 teaspoon ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon dried oregano
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
1/2 teaspoon coarse salt
1 teaspoon black peppercorns
2 1/2 tablespoons sherry vinegar
1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil



STEAK AND GARNISH:

1 1/2 pounds steak (rib eye, skirt, or club) 4 navel or Valencia oranges Flour tortillas (optional)

Directions:

Combine the first 8 ingredients in a processor work bowl. Pulse on and off until the garlic and parsley appear to be minced and make a coarse paste.

Add the vinegar and olive oil, and pulse until well blended. Let the mixture sit for a few hours to allow the flavors to meld.

Brush steaks with 2 tables poons of the sauce and let sit for 1/2 hour. Marinate skirt steak in half of the sauce for 3-4 hours to tenderize.

Cut the tops and bottoms off the oranges and cut away all of the rind, leaving a ball of orange. Slice the oranges horizontally into 1/4-inch slices. Set aside.


Grill the steak over medium-hot coals until medium rare (about 10 minutes per inch of thickness of steak.)

Slice the steak across the grain and place on the center of a platter. Place the orange slices around the meat and drizzle with some of the remaining chimichurri sauce.

Note: If you like, you may place some of the meat, sauce, and oranges in a tortilla and wrap it up, like eating fajitas. This is not traditional but fun!










THE LIBRARY CORNER — Sandy Saviet & David Richter

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund**: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- Endowment Fund: Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/ restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- **Religious School Scholarship Fund:** These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund**: a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- Youth Group Fund: a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.


