FROM THE RABBI - *Rabbi Paul Schreiber, Reb Tuviah*

This High Holiday season, 5781, is upon us and proves to be unique in most of our lives. The idea of a closed synagogue and the inability to gather with one another for these most precious days is something most if not all of us have ever experienced before. And so, we should be asking ourselves an important question: "How will I be observing the High Holidays this year?" Of course, if I were approached and asked that question, I, as a rabbi, would answer, "Attend services in any which way possible!"

What will that look like this year? Well, in two words ... Zoom and Facebook. We have all come to learn this form of technology, and even those who could barely find the power button on their computer are now commenting in the chat window, sharing their screens, and, most importantly, muting and unmuting when appropriate! And so, to continue my answer to the question posed, virtual live streaming is the way to attend a holiday service. Is it my first choice? I can answer that with a resounding NO! But it is our only choice, and for that we must be thankful; we must be grateful. My fear is that some people will choose not to attend services virtually because that's just simply not the way we've ever done it before. I completely understand that feeling, but any student of history would be hard-pressed to find an extended period of time when the Jewish people were not put in uncomfortable situations. Throughout the history of the Jews, we have found ourselves in times where our temple doors have been shuttered, where we have been forced to observe our holy calendar in unique and challenging ways. This, by no means, is the first time we have been forced to do things differently. When looking back in our history, we find times when not only were the temple doors closed, but our synagogues were actually burned to the ground and our holy Torah scrolls thrown in fire pits while we, as a people, watched in helpless agony as those who persecuted us had their way. We stood by and watched as they attempted to destroy our faith and destroy us as a people.

When I think of the situation we are in today, although extremely uncomfortable and monumentally difficult for so many of us, I can't help but think there just may be another way to view all that has and continues to happen. In no way am I intending to suggest our pain is not real, but what I am saying is that we as a people have seen much worse, and, in reality, the situation we find ourselves is survivable and even at times beneficial. Our temple doors have not been shuttered because those who hate us have locked the doors. We chose to lock our own doors for the sake of the public good. We are still free to practice our faith as we see fit, our families are not separated, and our Torah scrolls are safe. There have been no laws put in place prohibiting the learning of Torah but rather, due to virtual technology, we have been afforded opportunities of Jewish learning we've never had access to before. For our sect of Judaism, services have not been canceled. Instead there's been more activity than ever before as attendance at so many of our virtual offerings far exceed the numbers we've experienced in the past.

So at this point, one might assess I am advocating for closed doors and continued virtual services. Nothing could be further than the truth! I long for the day to be back in the synagogue, in our beautiful sanctuary, praying, singing and learning together as a family. But in the meantime, my heart's desire is that we will maintain that closeness, albeit virtually, by attending all of the High Holiday services. Now more than ever it is most important to stay connected to our faith and to each other in any way we can. Rather than place your focus on what is different this year, I ask you to focus on what is the same: the High Holiday melodies that we will indeed be hearing, the stories we will be told, the familiar prayers and the familiar sounds ... all that has kept Judaism alive for thousands of years. I ask you to embrace this time as we are all given the unique opportunity to explore these Days of Awe on a much more personal note than we've ever had before. Perhaps you will learn something about yourself and your own unique Jewish path as this High Holiday season just may be the most personal and reflective season of your life!

could do better, please just let me know. I want to hear what you have to say. We, as a congregation, want to improve. We need to ensure Congregation Beth Shalom is a place that you enjoy and where you feel at home.

We remain committed to making Congregation Beth Shalom the center of Jewish life in Brandon and eastern Hillsborough County. This has been our mission since the congregation was formed 30 years ago. We provide not only a physical location but a place for our community to learn (Torah), pray (Avodah), and serve (G'milut Chasadim).

We need to be a congregation that practices Big Tent Judaism where all are welcome and you get to be the Jew you want to be. We need to open dialogues so that we appreciate alternative approaches and thought processes and to reach consensus on those things that we all, as Jews, hold most sacred.

We are committed to families in which only one spouse is Jewish, to be welcoming and respectful to the non-Jewish spouse. We are committed to teaching our children what it means to be Jewish, our traditions, and to ensure we are doing what is needed so the next generation can carry on the traditions and beliefs that have been established over the past 5,000 years.

From Isaiah 58: 12, "Your people will rebuild the ancient ruins and will raise up the age-old foundations. You will be called the Repairer of the Broken Walls, Restorer of Paths to dwell in." This prophecy was fulfilled when the Second Temple was built in Jerusalem after Cyrus the Great of Persia allowed the Jews to return to Israel, ending the First Exile.

We too, as a community, must rebuild Congregation Beth Shalom, the House of Peace. We desperately need your assistance to maintain our programming and the services we offer our community. This year the congregation is facing greater financial pressure than it has faced since I have been a member. HIGH HOLIDAYS

Shalom to my congregational family and guests to this edition to *The Kibbitzer*! I hope this email finds everyone safe and healthy.

We are now approaching the beginning of a new Jewish year, 5781. This is the time that we must reflect on our past year and how we have lived our lives as Jews. We must take this time to consider our past, change our present, and build for our future. We must decide how we wish to live 5781 in a meaningful way, honoring our Jewish traditions.

The High Holy Days are always a busy time at Congregation Beth Shalom. To help you navigate the holidays, we are including the High Holy Days schedule. We of the Ritual Committee encourage you to attend the Selichot service and our High Holy Days Services, led by our Reb Tuviah and Cantorial Soloist Sandy Santucci.

As is our custom at CBS, we will offer our full complement



of services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Shortly after Yom Kippur, we celebrate Sukkot Under The Stars, and then close the High Holy Days Season with our Simchat Torah celebration.

You should be receiving your High Holy Days Packets in the mail, where you will find a schedule of all events and your tickets. Please bring the tickets to temple during the High Holidays for admission to services as a security measure. Worship services will be offered virtually via Zoom and the Congregation Beth Shalom Facebook page.

The packet will also include additional information about High Holy Days traditions and customs, as well as our usual materials, including information about our Tree of Life and Yahrzeit Plaque opportunities.

Also, for those who observe Yizkor, PLEASE remember to fill out the Book of Remembrance (BOR) form and follow the instructions for returning it. Add any new names you wish to have read as part of the service. If you had names included in it last year, you should have had those names included with your BOR form in this year's packet. Please take a moment to check the names and spellings to ensure there are no errors. (If there are, please correct and return—if there are not, please still return the form!) Save Money on Your Taxes with a Qualifying Charitable Distribution (Maybe)

According to Charity Navigator, charitable giving is a great way to support organizations like Congregation Beth Shalom with the added bonus of earning a greater tax deduction. Here's what you need to know that may help you save some money on your taxes this year (and in future years as well), especially if you use the standard deduction when filing your taxes. If you are 70 1/2 or older, have a qualifying retirement plan and help support a qualifying tax-exempt 501(c)(3) charity such as CBS, you can request that a "Qualified Charitable Distribution" from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) be sent directly to your supported charity. You could then advise your plan administrator to reduce your retirement income by the amount of your charitable gift. That way you can avoid paying taxes on your donation because your gifted amount effectively lowers your adjusted gross income.

Due to the recent increases in the standard deduction, many fewer taxpayers now itemize on Schedule A, making this up-front deduction potentially even more important. So, using an IRA to make a charitable donation can help lower a tax bill and help a worthy cause! In addition, your plan can send your gift in (for example) monthly, quarterly or yearly installments to the qualifying charity and then reduce your income distribution accordingly if you so direct. You would get less money from your IRA but if you were donating to the charity anyway, it is a wash and you are saving money on your taxes. Your gift can be deducted from your reported income by your plan at your request, thereby reducing your tax burden.

Here's how it works: Say your monthly dues to CBS is \$150 and you make a High Holiday pledge of \$600 this year. You instruct your retirement plan to deduct \$300 per month, starting in September, for the next four months until the end of the year (\$150 for dues and \$150 towards your HHD pledge). Your donation of \$1200 by the end of the year can then, at your request, reduce your income by that amount—\$1200 (if you wish), a deduction from your income on which you would owe no taxes. Further, if you have to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) because you are 72 or older, you can instruct your retirement plan to reduce your RMD by the amount of your yearly gift if you wish, leaving more money in your retirement plan. This is not necessary this year because in 2020 you are not required to take an RMD.

That's a quick look at this relatively new tax strategy. Since I am not a tax professional, please contact your retirement plan administrator and your tax advisor or accountant if you have one to see if you would benefit implementing this plan. Questions? DONATIONS

Congregation Beth Shalom accepts donations for many purposes, with a variety of opportunities for donors to support the good works of the Temple. You may contact the office either by phone or email to make a contribution, or head to our website to make a secure online payment through a PayPal account or by using a credit card.

Funds:

- **General Fund** (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund:** A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.
- **Endowment Fund:** Gifts to this fund are placed in an investment account and temporarily restricted or can be defined/restricted by the donor. This fund ensures the future of our temple.
- **Religious School Scholarship Fund:** These funds will be made available to Religious School students who are in need of tuition assistance, as determined confidentially by the Treasurer.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund:** a fund for assistance to families in need, scholarship assistance, interfaith council, Holocaust museum and other endeavors at the Rabbi's discretion.
- **Youth Group Fund:** a fund that supports the ongoing engagement of post b'nai mitzvah youth, providing meaningful and fun experiences for our teens, and keeping them connected to their Jewish community.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- **Adopt-A-Book:** A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- **Bricklets:** For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life:** The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- **Yahrzeit Plaque:** To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$350. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.
