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FROM THE RABBI - Rabbi Paul Schreiber, Reb Tuviah

<u>All Of Us Were There</u>

A few weeks ago, we read the two combined Torah portions called "Nitzavim" and "Vayelech" (Deuteronomy chapters 29-31). "Nitzavim," a powerful teaching on its own, became even stronger in the time of the year we read it ... immediately preceding Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. While in biblical times there may not have been grand gatherings of most of the Israelites, the High Holy Days evolved quickly to be the central time to be together as



a community. "Nitzavim" is a small section that contains a mini-teaching, almost a synopsis, or a mini-Torah. Translated simply, it can mean, "We are present (standing) ..." just as we imagine the Jewish community at this auspicious time of year. The universality and power of Nitzavim have even inspired some to read this as an alternative to traditional Torah readings on the High Holy Days, such as Yom Kippur morning or afternoon.

The portion opens with the statement addressed to all of the people. To help us not misinterpret or gloss over this moment, we are presented with a list: "You are all present here today: leaders, tribes, elders, officials, adults, children, spouses, and the resident aliens among you; from the woodchopper to the water hauler." We read a few verses later that this teaching is not only from the past, meaning those in the wilderness, but also with those "not yet here with us today," linking that moment to all future generations, placing each consecutive generation at the moment of being together. Yet in this year of the COVID-19 pandemic, it also highlights the power of community both when we physically gather and when we are unable to gather physically. Just as the blind person often develops heightened senses (of hearing and touch), so too must we awaken to the other senses of spirit that are a challenge to us when we cannot gather and congregate physically. This powerful teaching contains an awareness that the future will not look the same as the present moment nor will we understand the teachings the same way and that being mindful of the central values and teachings is a key to future success.

It is the experience as described in the text, of going from a slave in Egypt to a free person with the deep understanding of Torah, that leads to the covenant of understanding — we were all slaves, we were all outsiders, we were all strangers in a strange land, and that experience and knowledge should drive our actions, ethics, and community. This is why the Jewish community has a heightened sensitivity to the conversation around racism, civil rights, respectful dialogue between those with differing opinions, and the equitable treatment of all people.

As we begin the year 5781, we should be asking questions such as how do we think future Jewish generations will interpret this moment in time? How will it bring a deeper meaning to our lives?

May we all find the path to peace within ourselves, our families, our community, our country, and our planet as we enter 5781.

More importantly, by increasing our membership, we can better fulfill our mission and remain the center of Jewish life in eastern Hillsborough County.



Monday, Nov. 16, at 7 p.m., Page Turners will meet in a Zoom session for a discussion of Mary Morris's book *Gateway to the Moon*. In her book she weaves together the contemporary story of Miguel Torres, a young man desperately trying to escape an impoverished New Mexico town, with the tales of his ancestors' long journey from Spain. Tracing back to the expulsion of Jews and Muslims in 1492, this novel tells the story of the Jews who held on to their heritage despite the family rupture and torture they endured and poses questions about what connects and claims us.

While this is a work of fiction, there is an historical basis for the story. It touches on the expulsion of the Jews from Spain, the Inquisition, and the settlement of Crypto-Jews

in New Mexico. There is so much going on in this book besides the historical back story. There is the growth of young Miguel and relationship with his employer, Rachel Rothstein. While reading the book, I actually felt like I was in contemporary New Mexico. This was one of those "I cannot put this book down" books.

THE LIBRARY CORNER — Sandy Saviet



This year we learned how to observe and enjoy the High Holidays from a perspective outside our synagogue.

With our new rabbi, Reb Tuviah, we employed the "Zoom" or virtual method of participating in Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Although this is being written prior to those Holy Days, I feel I can predict those observances have been satisfying, even if presented differently.

Here's hoping the new year will give us wonderful opportunities to learn about ourselves and our world. Due to COVID-19, please check the eblast for the most current information and details.



will also light the bonfire and make s'mores.


Please wear your mask. We will also be creating a special parking area for anyone who wants to come but wants to stay extra socially distant. Weather may affect this celebration.



HOLIDAY COOKING

Moroccan Sweet Couscous with Mixed Dried Fruits

This dish is now a staple on my buffet table for all fall Jewish holidays, because I like to incorporate a "new fruit" (pomegranate) or fall fruits (raisins, apples, pears in their dried form) for Rosh HaShanah and Sukkot. Though this traditional Moroccan dish is typically served for Hanukkah, it's too tasty to be relegated it to just that one holiday.

Streamline the preparation time by using dried, alreadychopped fruit, and use any combination of dried fruit that you want. This is a very kid-friendly recipe and a great way to get those iron-packed fruits into their diet.

INGREDIENTS

1 cup Israeli couscous 2 tablespoons unsalted butter or pareve margarine 1/4 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

One 7-ounce package of chopped mixed dried fruit or 1 1/2 cups assorted dried fruits

1/3 cup whole almonds, roasted and coarsely chopped
2 tablespoons pine nuts, lightly roasted
1/3 cup milk with 3 drops of almond extract added
Cinnamon, pitted Medjool dates, pomegranate seeds, and/
or apricot slivers for garnish

DIRECTIONS

• Cook couscous in a large pot of boiling salted water for 7 to 10 minutes or until tender but still firm. Drain, but do not rinse, and place in a large mixing bowl.

• Melt the butter or margarine in a 1-cup bowl in the microwave for 35 seconds. Add the sugar and cinnamon and stir to combine. Pour the mixture over the couscous to coat thoroughly.

• Add the dried fruit and roasted nuts.

• Mix the 3 drops of almond extract into the milk. Add just enough of the milk to the couscous to moisten it. Do not add too much or the mixture will be runny. Reserve excess milk in case the couscous is dry. Remoisten before you garnish.

• Pile the couscous into a mound or pyramid shape on a serving platter. Sprinkle with additional cinnamon and garnish with Medjool date halves, pomegranate seeds, and/ or apricot slivers.

Additional Notes

• Israeli couscous is a large, milled ball of pasta approximately 1/8 inch in diameter.

• Coating couscous with butter or margarine prevents the mixture from clumping. However, it still holds together beautifully when mounded.

Funds:

- General Fund (unrestricted): An unrestricted gift to the General Fund allows the temple to use those funds wherever they may be needed most. This fund incorporates contributions received from our High Holy Day Appeal, Yahrzeit donations, Bricklets, Adopt-A-Book, Tree of Life (unless otherwise indicated) and other non-restricted gifts.
- **Building Fund**: A fund to ensure the continuing physical growth of our spiritual home. Intended for capital improvements and major building repairs.

If you wish to designate a gift to a particular purpose, for example, Food Bank, Choir, Oneg, Social Action, etc., you may do so by noting as such on your payment method or with an accompanying note; otherwise, your gift will be used where it is needed most.

Opportunities:

- Adopt-A-Book: A dedication label will be placed in one of our prayer books, to commemorate a simcha or in honor or memory of a loved one for just \$54.
- Bricklets: For as little as \$9 you can send a Bricklet Card instead of buying a card for birthdays, condolences, etc. A Bricklet Card in your name will be sent to the person you wish stating that a donation has been made in his or her name to Beth Shalom to honor the occasion.
- **Tree of Life**: The Tree of Life is on the back wall of our Sanctuary. An engraved leaf or stone can commemorate many simchas, b'nai mitzvah, wedding, birth, graduations, etc. Leaves are \$180, and stones are \$1800.
- **Yahrzeit Plaque**: To honor the death of a loved one, you may purchase a plaque that will be cared for in perpetuity for \$350. The name of the deceased along with their date of death is included on the plaque.


