

Our first choice for the new year will be, "And the Dead Shall Rise". We will meet for discussion on **Monday**, **February 21**st at 7:00 PM.


Mary Phagan, a 13 year old factory worker in Atlanta, Georgia, was raped and murdered in 1913. Leo Frank, the factory superintendent where Mary worked, was arrested, tried, and convicted of her murder. His death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment. The case gained national attention and while many thought he was wrongly convicted; he was kidnapped from prison and lynched. His story became the focus of social, regional, political and racial concerns, and in particular, antisemitism. This book is the full account of the event, including the identities of the people who conducted and covered up the crime. The aftermath of the lynching saw the revival of the Ku Klux Klan and the evolution of the Anti-Defamation League.

Time for a Nosh



I have a subscription to The Nosher, a twice weekly newsletter. It is a Jewish food newsletter and has everything in it from recipes, history of Jewish food, restaurants to visit in Israel and new Jewish foods available at Trader Joes. I was going through today's issue and what caught my eye was, "We Should All Be Eating More Babka This Year". Who can resist an article like that? Actually, I did put that one on hold, preferring to check out Michael Solomonov's Hummus Recipe.

I fell in love with hummus when I first visited Israel when I was twenty years old. My eldest sister has lived in Jerusalem for almost fifty years, and she delighted in showing me around. After being dragged to the Wailing Wall within a few hours after having landed in Tel Aviv, I protested I couldn't walk another step due to the jet lag. She finally let me sleep a few hours and then bounced on me and dragged me out of bed. We were going to have hummus for breakfast. I had never heard of hummus, I was still tired and I didn't like eating breakfast. She pushed on in great humor, none the less, and we ended up in this tiny restaurant with only five tables in east Jerusalem. The walls were painted a shade of green that I thought was ghastly, and there were Elvis posters everywhere. It seemed like such a clash of culture, and I felt awkward and out of place.

Then, we were served hummus and many other things that I still don't like to eat. She showed me how to tear off a piece of pita and dip into the creamy hummus. I was hooked. It was amazing. Best hummus I've ever eaten. Well, at that time, it was the only hummus I had eaten, but still, it was fabulous. When I returned to the States, I'd go to the "hippy" restaurants in Ann Arbor, because they were the only ones who served hummus. This was back in the late 70's when Saturday Night Live was still funny. It was frustrating. Everywhere I went, the hummus was awful, and I despaired of not getting decent hummus until I went back to Israel.

Eventually, I found a recipe and I'm sorry I can't cite where I found it, but it's been my favorite ever since. I'm going to share this recipe with you, since Michael Solomonov's recipe makes you use real garbanzo beans which you need to soak overnight and make your own tahini. This was way too much for me back in college, since I was always tired from early days at the hospital and not doing so well in biochemistry. I wanted delicious, but easy. So, enjoy.

1 - 15 ounce can garbanzo beans, drained
1/4 cup tahini or 2 tablespoons of creamy peanut butter mixed with 1 tablespoon of hot water and 2 teaspoons of sesame oil
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 tablespoon olive oil or salad oil
3 cloves of garlic
1/4 teaspoon salt

Place all of the above ingredients in a food processor and mix until everything is nice and creamy. Since everyone has their own idea of what hummus should taste like, try it and see if you'd like to add a little more salt, tahini, or lemon juice. Some recipes even call for cumin. My daughter would probably triple the garlic. But this is your hummus, and you get to decide. For serving, place on a large plate, drizzle more olive oil on top and sprinkle some paprika and chopped fresh parsley. Surround the hummus with cut up pieces of pita bread, and chopped onions, chopped tomatoes and cucumbers, olives, assorted vegetables and chick peas.

Jewish Athletes at Winter Olympics

The 2022 Winter Olympic Games begin Friday, February 4th and end on Sunday, February 20th. They are being held in Beijing, China.

Despite ongoing COVID chaos and mounting protests about China's human rights record, the 2022 Beijing Olympics are proceeding on schedule, just six months after the delayed Tokyo games — and we have your guide to the Jewish athletes who are on their way.

In Tokyo, dozens of Jewish athletes competed, and many clinched medals. The Winter Olympics are typically a smaller affair, with fewer sports and fewer countries participating. Nevertheless, we're excited to cheer on these Jewish athletes from the United States, Israel and Canada.

The Beijing Olympics begin Feb. 3 and run through Feb. 20, and the Paralympics will be held March 4 through March 13. The Games will be broadcast on NBC, USA, and CNBC, and the streaming service Peacock will broadcast all events live and on replay. Here's each Jewish athlete competing, and when they'll be on.
