Everyone remembers the story of that little baby boy in a basket who was aimlessly floating on the Nile River. The truth is that we should have never heard of him again because that basket should have kept on floating. The Nile eventually flows out to the sea and ocean - unless maybe a crocodile would snap up Moses.

Suddenly, the daughter of Pharaoh went down to bathe by the river. Her servants are walking beside her on the riverbank, since a princess is always accompanied. The servants are to serve the princess and protect her. Bathing in Judaism is somewhat of a symbol of cleansing oneself

It would be Pharaoh's daughter that recognized the Jewish people and their travails. The daughter pf Pharaoh sees something out of the ordinary floating on the water. It was a basket, which she told her maidservant to get ahold of and bring over. When the maidservant came back empty handed; the Pharaohs daughter stretched out her arm. "The story shows us Pharaoh's daughter personally saving an unknown abandoned child; she appears less concerned with status roles and more with compassion and action

The lesson from this portion of Torah is that the "outstretched arm and hand" of Pharaoh's daughter (that saved Moses) was the same imagery of the "outstretched arm and hand" (that had saved Israel and punished Egypt). Thus as noted in the Talmud reference to Psalm Psalm 3:8 the "outstretched arm and hand" breaks the power ("teeth") of the enemy. So the when the Red Sea collapsed upon the Egyptian Army, the same power delivered the Israelites from the enemy of HaShem. In this light, Pharaoh's daughter saw not only the child Moses, but the very presence of HaShem with him, who would lead the Israelites in disobedience to Pharoah."

There is a preface to everything that happens to a person. Something happens in the mind that acts as a catalyst for what eventually occurs. In the way that a person wishes to go, in that way they are led. The path to success is paved with good intentions.

Choose a path of success. If you want something, run for it. Continue to spend time thinking about what is important. Let us continue to learn the ideals that direct us on the road to greatness.

Passover

The Perfect Seder – A story

It was the first night of Passover. And Rabbi Shalom had just finished hosting her seventieth seder. Her belly was full of food and wine. And she'd lay herself down to sleep.

That night, she had the strangest dream. She dreamt that the prophet Elijah was in her room. She looked up and said, next you're in Jerusalem, Elijah. And he responded, yes, or maybe at the home of Abe the water carrier. That is the seder I'm heading to next. It's about to begin, and I don't want to miss it. Rabbi Shalom was confused. Elijah in my room? You're going to go to Abe the water carrier's seder? Hmm. Strange indeed. And she drifted off back to sleep.

In the morning, she remembered her dream and quickly called to all of her students and said, quick, I need you to find Abe the water carrier. The profit Elijah was going to go there last night. And I need to talk to him about his seder. If his seder is better than mine, I want to meet this righteous man.

So, the students went out and quickly went to find him. They didn't have to spend much time because as it turned out, the next door neighbor of the rabbi was Abe the water carrier. The students brought Abe the water carrier in to meet the rabbi. And all of a sudden, Abe started crying. I'm so sorry, rabbi. I don't know where all the food and silver platters came from. Please don't tell anyone. I didn't steal anything.

The rabbi looked at Abe and said, don't worry. That's not why I brought you here. But I do want to know what happened at your seder last night. Abe replied, well, I had every intention of doing the seder, but I was so tired, and I dozed off. And then my wife woke me up and asked, Abe, aren't we going to do the seder?

And I was feeling so despondent. I'm not good enough. I don't know about all the steps of the seder. And I said, all I know is that once we were slaves and God freed us.

And then that's when it all happened. All of a sudden, the table was filled with food and wine and silver platters. I don't know where it came from. And I looked at my wife, and she said, hurry up. Let's eat before it disappears. I don't know how it got there.

So, the rabbi then said, so tell me. After you ate, you went and did every step of the seder, right? You read every single word of the Haggadah, yes? Abe replied, well, no. I can't read. Well, rabbi said, did you do anything else?

Abe thought. Well, after we ate, I did give thanks. I said, thank you, God, for this wonderful food and wine. And then I said, thank you for freeing us from slavery. But can you help us now break the oppression and the injustice that we see in this world? Help us to do better now, God. And then all of a sudden, this man appeared and said, amen. I know. It seems so unbelievable.

All of a sudden, it became very clear to Rabbi Shalom what had happened. Her dream was no dream. That was Elijah in her room, eager to go to Abe's seder. And now she knew why. Even though Abe hadn't done all of the steps and couldn't read the Haggadah, Abe knew the very essence of this holiday-- to remember that we were once slaves in Egypt, to thank God for giving us the taste of freedom, and remembering that the world still has much work to do, that we with God have much to do to make this world safe for freedom. And that was a good enough seder.

The rabbi then asked, Abe, well, what happened after that? Abe said, I fell asleep. And then your students came to find me. Am I in trouble? The rabbi shook her head and smiled. No, not at all, Abe. Next year in Jerusalem or maybe at your house.

A matzah bakery in Ukraine prepares for Passover under siege

A Ukrainian Matza bakery is working tirelessly these days to be able to bake as many matzahs as possible - in case a war breaks out with Russia and disrupts the routine of life.

The bakery was established more than 20 years ago in the city of Dnipro in the Dnipropetrovsk region, bordering the separatist province of Donetsk. A few months ago, a branch of the Ukrainian Matzah Bakery was also opened in the city of Uman.

"The two bakeries employ about 90 people, most of them members of the local Jewish community," said the new branch manager, Mendy Stumble. "The bakery's target this year is 100 tons of handmade matzah. Most matzahs are exported to the former Soviet Union, Western Europe and other countries. A small portion of the Matza are intended for use by the 160 communities united by the Jewish Federation of Ukraine."

According to Federation Chairman Rabbi Meir Stumbler, "We continue, as usual, believing and hoping that everything will work out and common sense will prevail. Even if war breaks out - and as we now see we are on the verge of one - everything will be done to keep the production line, because Passover is approaching and we want to make sure the matzah supply in Ukraine is not harmed."

"Matzahs are called 'the food of faith' in Judaism," said Rabbi Shmuel Kamintsky, rabbi of the city of Dnipro, who gives the Kosher certification to the bakery. "I believe and am sure that everything will work out peacefully. It is not easy, but the Jewish community is trying to remain optimistic. That is what holds us together."



Florida Holocaust Museum: Free Admission Day

The FHM will be honoring Yom HaShoah by offering free admission to the museum, in-person readings, and an evening commemoration program.

More than 100 individuals from our surrounding communities will read aloud the names of Holocaust victims in 5-minute intervals. Through our educational programs based on original artifacts, archival documents, and artwork, The Florida Holocaust Museum works daily to translate the staggering statistics of genocide into individual stories.

The **Reading of Names Commemoration** is another effort to remember the victims as individual people with life histories.

Reading the names of the Jewish men, women, and children killed during the Holocaust is a symbolic yet deeply personal way of remembering these individuals. Most victims of the Holocaust don't have graves — reciting their names allows for them to be memorialized while reminding us of their human dignity. Hearing their names offers us a chance to reflect on their lives and the events of the Holocaust while renewing our commitment to ensuring that such atrocities do not occur again.

The reading of names will be streamed on our Facebook page the entire day on April 28th. From **10:00 am to 4:00 pm**, individuals from our surrounding communities will read the names of Holocaust victims.

Shoah Victims' Names Recover Project

The Florida Holocaust Museum, in cooperation with Yad Vashem, is spearheading the **Shoah Victims' Names Recovery Project** in the Tampa Bay area.

Yad Vashem has been working with Holocaust survivors and Jewish communities for over 60 years to fulfill its mandate to preserve the memory of the six million Jews who were murdered in the Holocaust. Although 4.3 million of the six million victims are documented at Yad Vashem and in the Central Database of Shoah Victims' Names, millions of names and life stories remain unknown.

Yad Vashem urgently calls upon Jewish communities to recover their names through a worldwide **Shoah Victims' Names Recovery Project**. Unless we assume collective responsibility for completing this vital mission, some of them may be lost forever.

The Shoah Victims' Names Recovery Project aims to memorialize each individual Jew murdered in the Holocaust, by recording their names, biographical details, and photographs on special forms created by Yad Vashem, called Pages of Testimony. The Florida Holocaust Museum is honored to partner with Yad Vashem on this crucial initiative. We have so far collected over 700 Pages of Testimony. Once filled out, Pages of Testimony are mailed by Museum staff to Yad Vashem where they will be stored for perpetuity in Yad Vashem's Hall of Names as public commemoration for the Jewish people and all of mankind. The submitter will receive from the Museum a copy of every Page they submitted. We also scan photographs of individuals commemorated on the Pages of Testimony and save these images on a disc for the submitter and for Yad Vashem.

Time for a Nosh

When I was young, we'd celebrate Passover at my grandmother's home. It took me and my three siblings hours to clean and ready her kitchen for Passover. The biggest job was shlepping all the food and dishes downstairs to the basement and then carry up all of the Pesadic dishes. We would take our positions on the stairs and pass every item down to the next person. It still took a long time, but at least we didn't have to keep running up and down the stairs.

On the day of the seder, you could smell the wonderful aroma from her kitchen as we walked up the driveway. She was an amazing cook and baker, but we weren't so happy about not eating bread for an entire week. So, she developed a recipe for Pesadic rolls and they were very good. They didn't keep so well after one meal, so she always made sure to make them fresh for each Seder. I was saddened to learn that she never wrote the recipe down and I missed her rolls for several years, until I found a cookbook for Passover in my hospital gift shop. I bought the book, just because there was a recipe for rolls, and to my delight, it tasted very similar to hers. I hope you try this recipe and enjoy making and eating what I call, "Becky's Pesadic Rolls".

Becky's Pesadic Rolls

Ingredients:

½ cup oil

1 cup water

1 cup matzah meal

1 tablespoon sugar

1 teaspoon salt

4 large eggs

Processor:

Place oil and water in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Remove pan from heat. Combine the matzah meal, sugar, and salt and add all at once. Beat well with a wooden spoon.

Preheat oven to 350° F.

Insert metal blade into food processor. Put matzah meal mixture into work bowl. With machine running, add eggs through feed tube. Process until a ball is formed. Remove.

Oil your hands and shape the dough into 12 small balls. Place on ungreased cookie sheet about 2 inches apart. Bake 50 to 60 minutes.
